Now more than ever, United Way of Pitt County is focused on directly impacting people's lives and building a stronger community for us all.

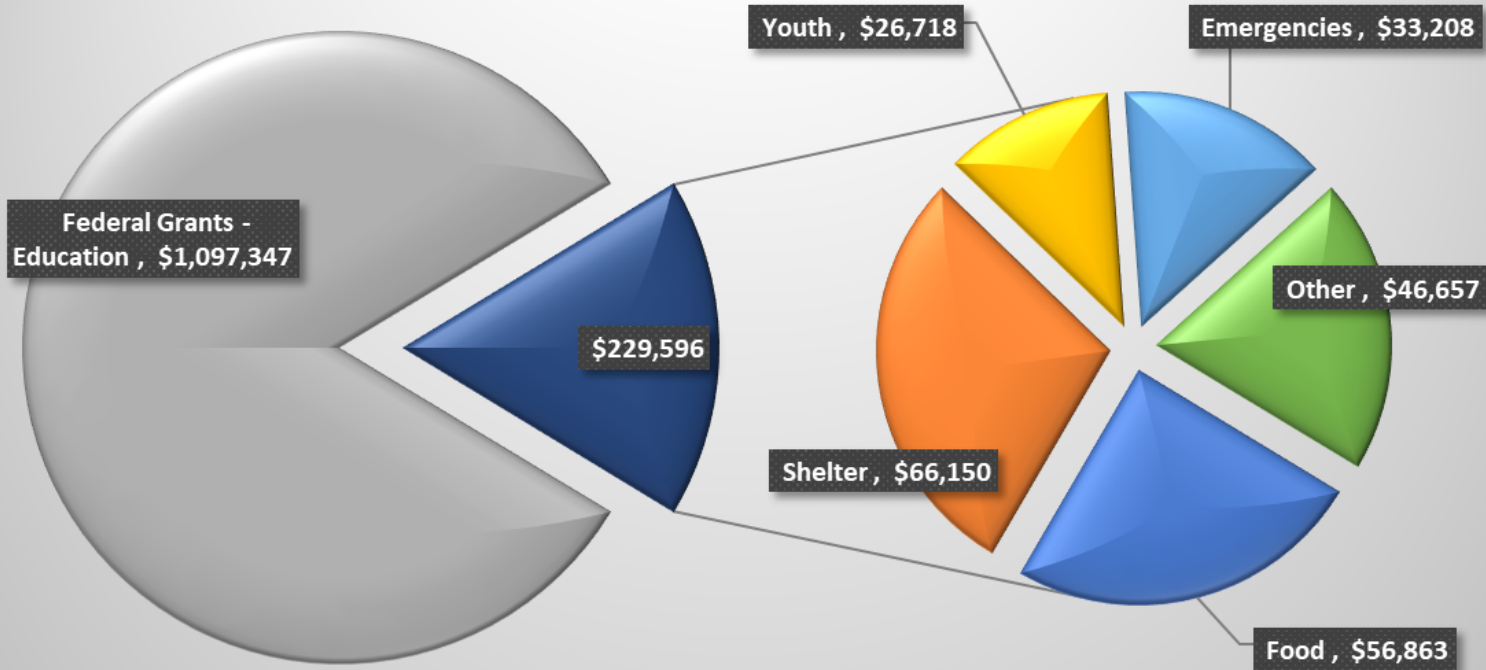

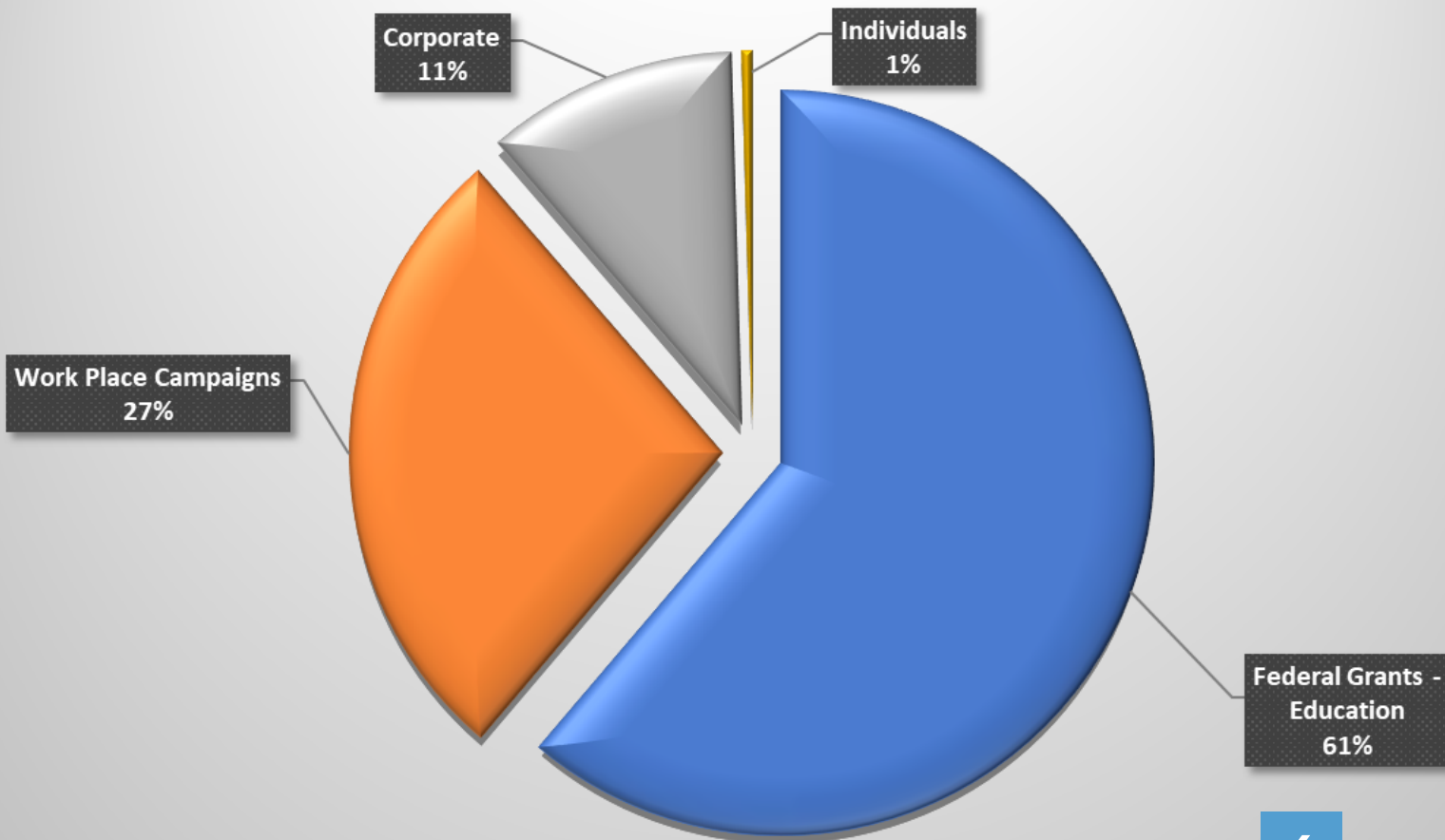

Ray Minges To Head Division Of Pitt UF

Dr. Ray D. Minges, Greenville surgeon, has been appointed to head the Professional Division of the Pitt County United Fund, Campaign Chairman J. Curtis Hendrix announced today. Dr. Minges, in accepting the appointment stated "Once each year we are given an opportunity to share in supporting the service agencies which are vital to the health and welfare of our community. I urge my fellow citizens to seriously consider the value of these agencies to each of us and to contribute generously to their support."

The Professional Division which Dr. Minges will head includes all of Pitt County's professional businessmen, including attorneys, accountants, architects, physicians, dentists, druggists, ministers, teachers and professional members of community service organizations.

Dr. Minges is a Greenville native, a graduate of Greenville High School, Davidson College and the Medical College of Virginia. Active in community affairs, he is a former member of the Greenville Utilities Commission, and has served the United Fund as president and in various other capacities. Presently he is a member of State Bank and Trust Company's board of directors. In his professional field, Dr. Minges is a member of the American Medical Association, the State Mental Association and the Seaboard Medical Association.

He and his wife, Virginia, have five children. The Minges are members of the Presbyterian Church, where he is an elder.

Parrott and his wife, Helen, have three daughters and reside at 601 Chagrin Lane. The family attends Oakwood Baptist Church.



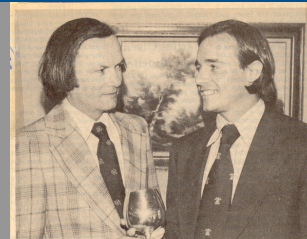
